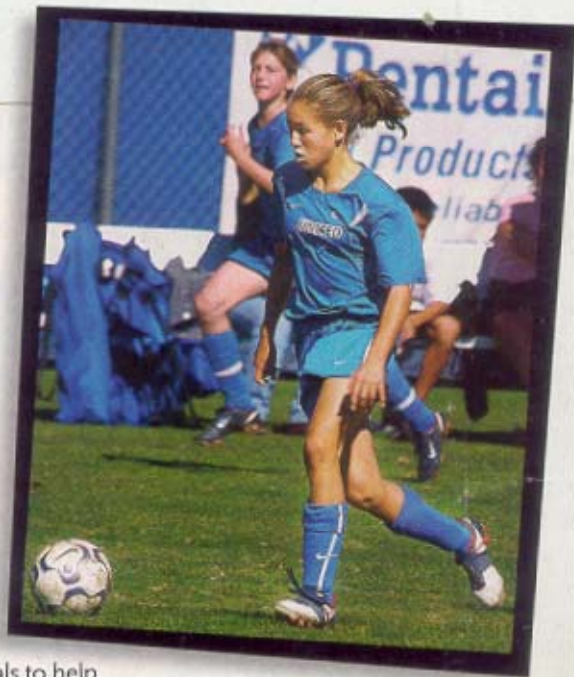


▲ Michael Cichy, 15
